Paul Ciardullo, 2 Bayberry Drive, tells the Mayor he "nailed it" in his opening paragraph of his letter to the public regarding the 2016-2017 budget. He then asks the Mayor if there is a message he is trying portray even though he is raising taxes. Mayor Dickinson responds that spending cannot go up to unsustainable levels.

Larry Morgenstein, South Main Street, inquires about opioids and heroin being a focus in the town over the past three years and asks how many pounds have been collected. Chief Wright responds that he is not sure but notes that our take back day was successful and efficient.

Don Kennedy, Bull Avenue, stated that he is tired of hearing the Mayor say that we have to cut services in order to cut expenses and went on to say that technology is less expensive than people.

7. Consider and Approve Interlocal Agreement Between the Towns of Wallingford and Cheshire for Police Services – Police Department

Chief Wright stated that this is a different agreement which gives authority for both towns to cross over town lines and have authority in both towns i.e. DUI check points.

Councilor Testa indicated that he is thrilled to see cooperation and asks if this is across the board for authority in both towns. Chief Wright replied yes but they won't be stepping on each other's toes.

Councilor Fishbein states that he has some reservations. He explains that we have no control over Cheshire staffing but we do have control in Wallingford. He will not vote in favor of this. Chief Wright states that he doesn't have too much concern on that part but we can sever this Agreement at any time.

Councilor Sullivan indicated that he thinks this Agreement is great and asked will we ever see Cheshire police working traffic in Wallingford.

Councilor LeTourneau refers to Page 3, Paragraph 2, of the Interlocal Agreement. He confirms with Chief Wright that either side can exit the Agreement within 30 days. Chief Wright responded yes and stated it is subject for review at any time by either party.

Joseph Ozzi, 43 Bayberry Drive, asked if we looked at models from other towns. Chief Wright responded that we looked at North Haven which has merged with six or seven other towns.

8. Chairman Cervoni opened the Public Hearing at 7:08 P.M.

Chairman Cervoni convened the public hearing and stated that the \$2,254,528 2016-2017 Capital Improvement Program bond ordinance which is the subject of this public hearing is available to the public and may be obtained at this meeting from the Town Clerk.

Councilor Laffin moved, and the motion was seconded by Councilor Sullivan, to read the title of the ordinance and to waive the reading of the remainder of the ordinance, incorporating its full text into the minutes of this meeting.

Paul Ciardullo, Bayberry Drive, stated that \$2,254,000 is already covered. Mr. Bowes explained it is the same amount as the bond and went on to say it is a bookkeeping matter. He stated it is an in and out of the General Fund.

Paul Ciardulo, Bayberry Drive, asked if we plan on spending.

Joseph Ozzi, 43 Bayberry Drive, asks what the interest rate is and who is able to pay these bonds. Mr. Bowes responded that we sell competitively and that eight to nine venders bid. He indicated we have about \$39,000,000 in debt.

Bob Gross, Long Hill Road, asks how long does a road last. Mr. Bowes responded 10 -15 years. Mr. Gross asks if this comes from electric money and Mr. Bowes said yes. Mr. Gross then asks what can we use this money for and Mr. Bowes states we use this money for infrastructure.

Gina Morgenstein, South Main Street, spoke about the charge of the Charter from the Council and asks if there is anything on that to help change how we budget. Mr. Bowes states that he has no problem with the Charter and noted that he was not part of the input to change the Charter. Gina Morgenstein stated that she is on the Charter Commission and would like these bonding issues to be discussed in the Charter revision process.

Paul Ciardullo, Bayberry Drive, states that he does not agree with this bonding.

Bob Gross, Long Hill Road, states that we do not have to spend CAP money to do a project. It would stay in the General Fund. Mayor Dickinson indicated that he does not think it is a good idea and that legally it can be done but we have to choose to do it.

Chairman Cervoni called the public hearing adjourned.

Counilor Laffin moved, and the motion was seconded by Councilor Shortell, that the ordinance entitled:

"AN ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING \$2,254,528 FOR THE PLANNING, ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION OF VARIOUS MUNICIPAL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS 2016-2017 AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUE OF \$2,254,528 BONDS OF THE TOWN TO MEET SAID APPROPRIATION AND PENDING THE ISSUANCE THEREOF THE MAKING OF TEMPORARY

BORROWINGS FOR SUCH PURPOSE," a copy of which is attached hereto, be adopted.

Councilor Testa explains that there was a time when he misunderstood the pilot of the electric money. He states it is not charter but ordinance driven. He also states that we can levy a tax up to two mills for CAP and non-recurring and asks can we can use to bond items. This item is not needed to be changed in charter it is an ordinance.

Councilor Fishbein indicated that maybe we should authorize only a portion of money. He doesn't see it necessary to authorize the full amount. Mayor Dickinson responded that some of it is State grant money that we need to have authorized to receive.

Town Clerk, Barbara Thompson, declared the ordinance adopted.

9. Adoption of Budgets for 2016-2017.

Councilor Laffin asks what happens if the budget does not receive five votes and Mr. Bowes responds that it then coverts to the Mayor's budget. Councilor Laffin then states that he cannot support spending surplus for the future budget of 2016-2017 when we will need surplus to balance this budget of 2015-2016. He indicated he will not make motions to support the budget.

Councilor Zandri asks if we've ever been zeroed out by the State and Mr. Bowes responds no. Councilor Zandri then asks if money ends up coming in from the state does it end up in the General Fund and Mr. Bowes responds yes.

Councilor Zandri stated inflations was 1 tenth of 1 percent and in this budget there is a 1.53% increase. He states that this tax increase will affect commercial businesses so everything we buy in town will go up. He is advocating for this year only to use surplus.

Councilor Fishbein states that throughout the Budget Workshops he sees spending that he shouldn't see. He doesn't think this is a stripped down budget and added that we give out money to non-profits that have no accountability to us. He indicates that he will not support this budget.

Councilor Shortell stated that he will not support this budget as amended.

Councilor Marrone stated that he cannot support this budget.

Chairman Cervoni stated that the only way to save money is to cut personnel. He also states that using surplus for one year is not good and that it's the beginning of deficit spending.

Mr. Testa seconded the motion.

Councilor Fishbein thinks Board of Education was overfunded last year and states that the Mayor adds to it this year.

Councilor Testa states there has always been an allocation in the budget to use surplus. There is a large chunk of money to be spent on one-time expenses.

Councilor Sullivan stated that most of the Councilors were satisfied with the Mayor's budget but the concern is with state funding and receiving those funds. He feels we will be in good shape with the Mayor's original budget. He explained that if we receive state funding it will go into the General Fund. Councilor Sullivan then stated that he wanted to make sure that all departments have what they need to keep our town the way it is. He will support this budget as amended.

Councilor Shortell stated that two years ago tonight Mayor Dickinson reduced \$500,000 in the Board of Education budget and the Council put that back in and the Board of Education wound up with a \$1.5 million surplus that year.

Councilor LeTourneau suggests that we look at the budget more than once a year. He states that he will support the budget as amended tonight and agrees that we cannot tap into reserves every time.

Councilor Zandri stated that Public Works never came to the Council this year for overtime or fuel. He states that it wouldn't surprise him to have a surplus of \$2,000,000 again.

Chairman Cervoni asked Mayor Dickinson if this year's state funding is still being cut. Mayor Dickinson responded that \$1.9 million will not be received this year.

Public Comment:

Gina Morgenstein, South Main Street, commented that the people getting laid off from the State cannot afford a tax increase.

Paul Ciardullo, 2 Bayberry Drive, stated that we raise taxes every year and we are out of balance.

Serge Mihaly, Southwind Road, stated that this is a difficult vote and next year will be worse. The State's deficit is huge.

Bob Gross, Long Hill Road, indicated that Councilor Zandri makes a reasonable Motion. He hopes that the town will find revenue sources. He stated to vote for this budget and let the Mayor veto it.

Larry Morgenstein, South Main Street, commented that it looked like everyone had a long budget season.

JOHN LETOURNEAU CALLS THE QUESTION. HE RECEIVES NO SECOND. MOTION FAILS.

Paul Ciardullo, states that you never know your decision until the moment of execution.

Councilor Fishbein asks Mr. Bowes what the current mill rate is. Mr. Bowes answers 27.47. He then confirms with Mr. Bowes that this amended budget has a tax increase and Mr. Bowes responds yes. Councilor Fishbein noted that both proposals have an increase in the mill rate.
